- Thirty-two days before funding runs out on December 20, 2024
- Projected adjournment is December 19, 2024
- In December departing Members lose office and staff
- The President-Elect will cast a long shadow


2024 Election Results

In the 2020 presidential election, seven states were won by less than three points.


States won by less than three points in the 2020 presidential election, by winning candidate








2024 Presidential Results







2024 Senate Results

Changes at the State Level

- Republicans will control 27 legislatures, Democrats 17
- Michigan House is now GOP controlled
- Minnesota House is now tied
- Democrats broke the supermajority in the NC House by 1 seat
- Democrats won 3 and Republicans won 8 Governor races (None flipped and none was closer than 9 points)
- Republicans control 27 and Democrats control 23


House Ag Committee Casualties

- Democrats lost the most
 - Spanberger (VA) and Slotkin (MI) left for other races
 - Caraveo (CO) was beaten

- Republican losses were smaller
 - Molinaro (NY) and Chavez-DeRemer (OR) lost
 - Duarte (CA) race is not called

Committee size and ratio should not change much

Senate Ag Committee Casualties

- Democrats lost two so far
 - Stabenow (MI) retired
 - Brown (OH) was beaten
- Republicans had one leave
 - Braun (IN) was elected governor
- Ratio may change replacing 1 of the 2 Democrats, adding 3 or more Republicans
- Thune likely will remain on the committee
- Will others leave the committee?

Other Senate Committees of Note

- Senate Finance lost four Democrats so far and Republicans had no losses
 - Casey (PA) is going to a recount
- Ratio will likely change replacing 1 or 2 Democrats, adding 2 or more Republicans
- Thune likely will remain on the committee
- Senate Appropriations lost 1 Democrat and 2 independents
 - Tester (MT) lost and Sinema (AZ) and Manchin (WV) retired
- Senator Rubio will resign once confirmed as Secretary of State


Other House Committees of Note

- Few House Appropriators lost
 - Garcia (R-CA), Carl (R-AL), Cartwright (D-PA)

- House Ways and Means will have at least 4 new members
 - Democrats Blumenauer (OR) and Kildee (MI) retired
 - Republican Steel (CA) is down 0.01% and Ferguson (GA) retired



What is a Recess Appointment?

- Constitutional provision to allow appointments when Congress is out of session
 - Was a big issue when Congress was in session about half the year
- More recently used when confirmation was proving slow for nominees
 - Often used with split control of government
- Can be made when the Senate is in recess for 10 days
- Appointments last for the remainder of the Congress
- This is the first time the practice is proposed for most or all appointees
 - The Senate would have to be complicit in this practice

The 100 Day House Agenda



They will use all tools at their disposal:

The Congressional Review Act to revisit Biden Administration Regulations

Budget Reconciliation to move legislation with a revenue impact avoiding the filibuster

Oversight to address spending



Priorities impacting Rural America will include:

Reauthorizing the 2017 Tax Bill
Encourage domestic energy production
Addressing the border and immigration
Redirecting unspent Climate Change
program funds

What is Budget Reconciliation?

- Process was adopted in 1974, first used in 1980
 - Twenty-three laws have been passed and four vetoed
- Principal focus was deficit reduction
 - Must address spending or revenue
 - Extraneous provisions are now subject to the Byrd Rule
- The process has two steps
 - The budget resolution includes reconciliation instructions (targets) to the committee(s)
 - The committee products are combined into an omnibus reconciliation bill
 - Debate is limited to 20 hours and only 50 votes needed in the Senate
- More recently used to pass difficult-to-pass bills
 - Affordable Care Act
 - Tax Cuts and Jobs Act
 - American Rescue Plan Act
